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




George Washington's 2nd Inauguration Podium
















The United States Constitution 1787


Congratulations you hold in your hands actual words from a printing of the US Constitution, actually printed the year George Washington became the 1st President.






Benjamin Franklin Letterpress Printing








A 1776 printing of the Declaration of Independence


When in the course of human events it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of Nature's God intitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.


We hold those truths to be self evident; that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. That to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; and, whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter and abolish it, and to institute a new government, laying its foundation on such principles, and organizing its powers in such form as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety










Letterpress words printed in a 1776 magazine


John Adams personally chopped this wood on his estate




Resolves of Massachusetts from the last year of the Revolution









Colonial American Cannonball

Wood from important War of 1812 ship USS Independence

War of 1812 Wood from "Old Ironsides" USS Constitution

Congratulations you hold in your hands wood from the most famous battleship of The War of 1812. This ship was nicknamed "Old Ironsides", because it appeared as if enemy cannonballs could not penetrate the ship.









Rare American Revolutionary War Bar Shot

Battle of Saratoga 1777 Cannonball


Congratulations you hold in your hands a piece of a cannon ball from the battle of Saratoga, the turning point of The American Revolution.

Congratulations you hold in your hands an actual musket ball fired, during The French & Indian War or The American Revolution.






Revolutionary War Era Furniture


Beautiful Handwriting from the 1700s








Resolves of Massachusetts from the last year of the Revolution




Rare and Original Rev War Period Engraved Portraits
